

## DEATH AS A FRIEND

Scripture: The invitation of the Lord is, "Come to me, all who labor and are heavy-laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light" (Matt. 11:28-30).

### MEDITATION:

Death does not always appear the same. Where it lays its hand upon children or young people while in the

midst of their youth, it seems premature. When death snatches a middle-aged man in the prime of life, it is an unwelcomed guest. When death tears an infant out of the arms of its ~~sad~~ mother, it is without mercy. When death reaches into a home to remove a father or mother, leaving crushing responsibilities upon the companion, death is no respecter of persons.

However, <sup>John Farrow</sup> when one has lived a long, useful life, or when one has toiled through long, trying days looking to "some enchanted evening;" <sup>Christ</sup> when one's friends and family are equally <sup>in heaven</sup> ~~on the other side~~, or when illness lingers through endless days and nights and hope for recovery is gone - then death comes as an angel of mercy. It is the answer to the oft-repeated <sup>prayer</sup> sigh, "Lord, now let your servant depart in peace....For mine eyes have seen your salvation." These words were spoken originally by ~~the patriarch~~, Jacob, when he had little strength in his dying body, and <sup>I believe they</sup> ~~surely~~ indicate to us today that to those who have lived long useful lives, death comes indeed as a friend.

1. Death is a friend because it brings release.

After death that follows an illness, it is not uncommon to hear relatives say, "Though it is hard for us, yet we know death has come as a blessing. We know it is best for her." The thought which prompts such statements is the release from sleepless nights, from agony, and long, days of suffering.

I remember reading the Bible to a suffering hospital patient. I was reading from the book of Revelation these words, "there shall be no more sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain..." And from jaws clenched in agony, came the reply, "Won't that be wonderful - no more pain." And that is why I can say that death comes as a friend.

It means freeing oneself from the limitations of a wornout, diseased body and setting the spirit free for further development. It means vacating a house that has been ruined by storm, and moving into a large, spacious mansion with a beautiful view of the mountains and the sea. It means the transmission set is worn out and a new one must be found.

It means harvesting the precious grain from a stalk bent by the last frost of fall. *For Veronica, death came as a friend*

2. DEATH IS A FRIEND ALSO BECAUSE IT IS A TIME OF REWARD.

Too often we think of death as coming to destroy everything for which we have lived; we should picture death as coming to save those we love. Many times we think of death as the end; but our faith causes us to think of death as the beginning of a more abundant life. We often think of losing, when we should <sup>reap</sup> gain. We think of parting, instead of arrival. It is not closing the door; it is opening the gate to eternity. It is not paying a debt; it is taking a note to a bank and obtaining gold in exchange. It is not a passing to mourn; rather it is a promotion to enjoy.

I once knew a man who had the right spirit, for he said to his dying mother, "I'm going to let you go now, Mother. Have a good time. You have earned this joy."

The Bible says it beautifully, "They shall hunger no more, neither thirst any more; the sun shall not

strike them, nor any scorching heat. For the Lamb in the midst of the throne will be their shepherd, and he will guide them to springs of living water; and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes."

(Rev. 7:16-17)

In heaven the Bible tells us that all the hungers of life shall be satisfied. Here on the earth people hunger - not only physically but spiritual. Here on earth - the deep, inner, fundamental longings of the human heart are not <sup>always</sup> satisfied, but in heaven they are. Here we strive for shelter and security, but in heaven we live in the perfect peace of God. Here our eyes are damp with tears, all life is filled with some heartbreak and disappointment; but in heaven, tears shall be wiped away, <sup>always</sup> ~~wings~~ shall be righted, and there shall be no pain." How wonderful. "Eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man, the things which God hath prepared for them that love Him."
